Please use these same Section headings (1, 2 and 3) and the Subsection headings (a), (b), (c), just as below. **The report must be in understandable English**. It does not have to be perfect English – we will edit it for language clarity – but we must be able to understand it. Thank you.

Section 1. Introduction

(a) General Introduction

describe your reasons for participating in the project, and a little bit about the problems faced by the communities in which you conducted Field Hearings

(b) Your Group

tell a little about your civil society group, NGO, academic research group, or just a few people who decided to participate in this project.

(c) People who Conducted the Project

Who helped besides you? Please send your CV and that of other primary people (decision-makers) in the project.

(d) Field Hearings Methods and Problem-solving

How did you go about gaining participation in the communities? What was your earlier relationship to the community? How did you get (travel) to the communities? How did you conduct the Field Hearings (interviews, focus group discussions, or public meetings)? How did you document the outcomes? How did you protect the privacy of the participants? What problems did you encounter? How did you solve them?

Section 2. Field Hearing Summaries

Summarize <u>each Field Hearing separately</u>, one at a time – therefore, there will be 1, 2, 3, or more separate Summaries under Section 2.1 and 2.2. Please label them using the community name.

2.1. Community 1 (name) – General Description

(a) Location

(country, provinces or sections, name of local community)

(b) Number of People

(interviewed or participating in the focus group or public meeting)

(c) Age Category of Participants

(for example, ages 18 - 30, or ages 30 - 65)

(d) Economic Sector of Participants

(for example, are they farmers? small business owners? unemployed? factory workers? garment industry? etc.)

(e) Institutional or Group Affiliation of People, if any

(for example, are they all in a trade union? part of a religious institution? members of a development association? etc.)

(f) Gender Breakdown of Participants

(how many were women? men?)

(g) Population of the Community

(overall population of the community, for example, 500 people, or 1 million people)

2.2 Community 1 (name) – Detailed summary what the people said

This section contains the <u>thoughts and ideas of the people in the community</u> (not your thoughts). Please provide a detailed summary for these 5 themes. Remember, you are summarizing the remarks of <u>all</u> the people who participated in this one particular Field Hearing. If there was disagreement, explain the different positions and which types of people held which positions. For example, did women feel one way while men held a different position? You can also provide as many specific examples and direct quotations as you like.

- (a) Assess Trends
- (b) Speculate About Causes
- (c) Changes Needed for Sustainable Societies
- (d) Inequality (Perceptions of Privilege and Deprivation)
- (e) Articulate Wishes for the Future

Section 3. Your Summary of Overall Results

This section should reflect on <u>all</u> the Field Hearings you conducted. It should contain <u>your thoughts and interpretations</u> of what was said by community members, and what should be done.

(a) Interpretation of Results

your interpretation of what was meant, what was most important, and why

(b) Assessment of Differing Views

your assessment of the differences in viewpoints between groups or individuals, based on location of community, race & ethnicity, gender, age, economic circumstances, or any other factors that led to differences in experience and perspective

(c) What Could Be Done?

your assessment of what could be done to satisfy the common concerns and wishes

(d) Likely Outcomes?

your assessment of what are the likely options and outcomes in the foreseeable future

Section 4. Other Materials (Optional)

You may attach any other relevant materials here, including charts and graphs you developed to analyze data, essays or technical articles you wrote, links to websites with information about the communities or the issues of concern, etc.

We strongly encourage you to attach photos. These photos are one of the best ways to document the Field Hearings. Remember that you cannot take photos unless the people photographed agree. This is an important component of protecting their privacy.

These additional materials may or may not be used in the report, depending on how relevant they are and how long they are. A few of the best photos will be selected for the report and other presentations about the Field Hearings Project.
