NOTE TO INTERVIEWERS

Purpose of Field Hearings

1. to continue the global dialogue on the human future, drawing in the ideas of all people (not only highly educated people, business people, or decision-makers)
2. to reach and amplify local voices in order to create opportunities for all people to say what “sustainable societies” should mean
3. to channel the input of people into the Sustainable Development Goals process
4. to ensure that the subject of equity and equality is addressed in the Sustainable Development Goals process
5. to reach out to organizations and communities around the globe in order to build the movement for greater social and economic equality

Types of Questions

These draft questions below include both specific questions and open-ended questions. The specific questions limit the answers received because they frame the issues in one particular way. However, they will help us gain solid information on what people perceive as the main problems, causes, solutions and goals for their community and nation. The open-ended questions will give people a chance to think more creatively and come up with their own way of framing the issues.

Explaining the Questions to Field Hearing Participants:

Please explain to all participants that the purpose of Field Hearings is:

- to hear and understand the local community thoughts regarding the meanings and way of achievement of “sustainable society” and “equality”
- to present this information to the global discussions on Sustainable Development so that the voices of people from the Field Hearings can be heard by everyone and can influence the decisions that are made
- to learn which communities would like to follow up on these issues by helping to develop a strategic plan to achieve their own goals

Please explain that the information will be used only in a summary of comments, and names and other personal information will not be published or given to others.
